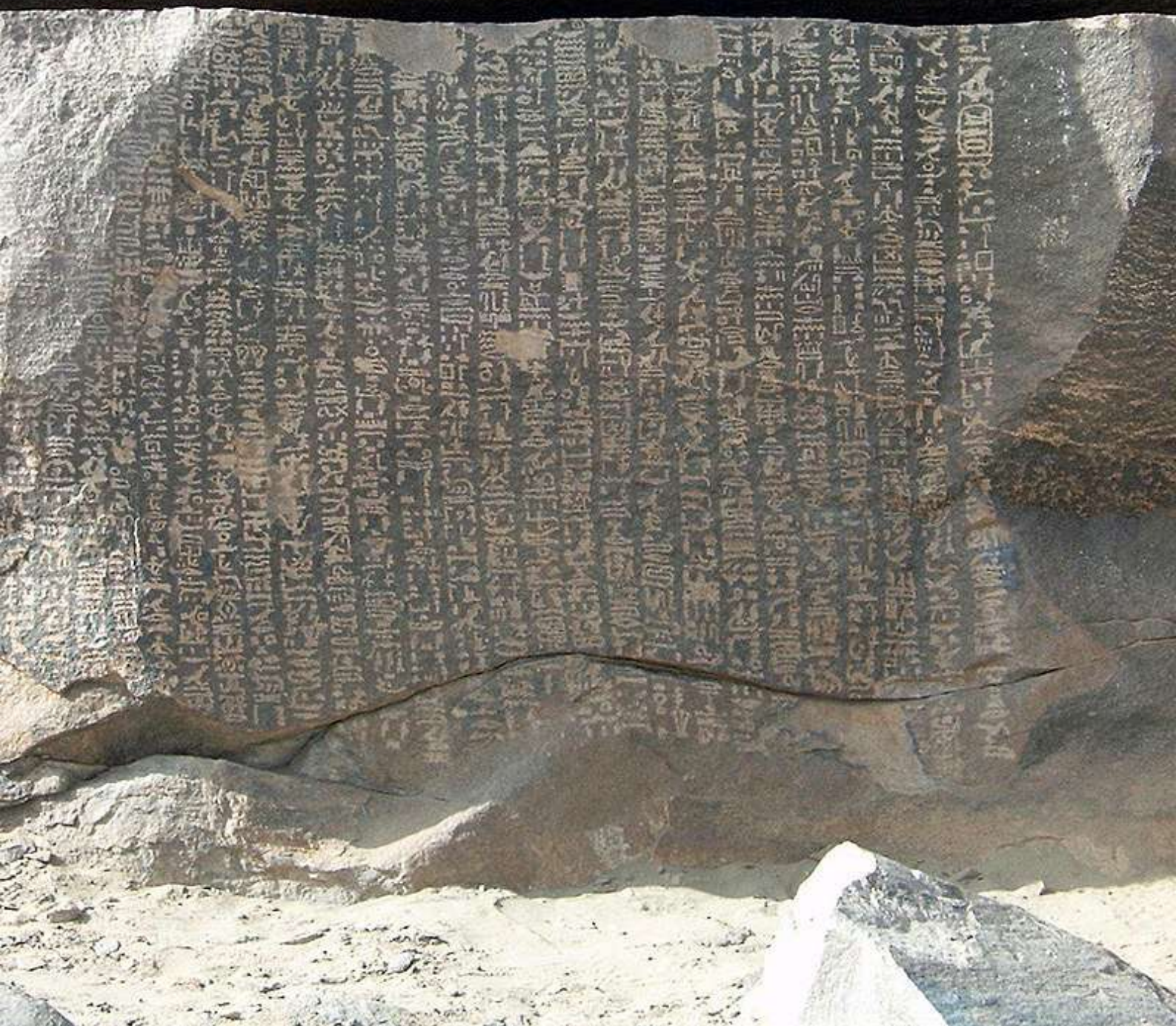

NATION-WIDE HUNT FINDS NO SIGN OF STONE

THIEVES VISIT MR. YOUNGER

DAILY RECORD REPORTS
DETECTIVES are investigating a theft at the home of Mr. Kenneth Younger, Minister of State, in Clarendon Grove, South Kensington, London.

He was away for Christmas at Tring when the robbery was discovered.

The thieves also stole about £20 of jewellery from Miss Felt, daughter of Sir Godfrey Felt, retired Indian civil servant, at Portree, Skye.

They broke in through the rear window of a basement flat occupied by Miss Felt and after searching her rooms climbed up a ladder into Mr. Younger's flat above.

Miss Felt told me, "I am friendly with Mr. Younger's family and often visit them."

The intruders overlooked jewellery in the flat occupied by Miss Felt, who was also away for Christmas in the country.

JEWELLERY STOLEN

Mr. Younger said last night: "The thieves took jewellery and clothing, but nothing of considerable value. I have not fully estimated the amount yet, but expect it will come to £250 worth of more."

"When the police told me of the robbery, I travelled to London and saw the flat had been searched by the intruders."

"I am making a more detailed check tomorrow. Jewellery belonging to Mrs. Younger is also missing."

The robbery was discovered when a maid found the basement flat had been entered.

Gave life for dog

An attempt to rescue his dog when it fell through the ice at a flooded part of the River Ouse, Lockhart, cost a 14-year-old boy his life yesterday.

The boy, Patrick McAlister, son of Mr. Joseph McAlister, 30 Balmaclellan Avenue, Lockhart, jumped in after the dog.

His 14-year-old cousin, Edward Docherty, 36 Leachford Avenue, Lockhart, followed him into the water, but he had great difficulty in getting back himself.

About two square miles of Loch Lomond, near Balloch railway pier was covered by half an inch of ice yesterday and many motor boats and houseboats were frozen at their moorings.



Yard starts check on all airlines and seaports

HIGH-PRESSURE work by Scotland Yard officers operating night and day has failed so far to retrieve the Stone of Destiny for Westminster Abbey.

Despite police patrols being maintained in bitter weather on all main roads from England, Scotland Yard stated last night that there was no trace of the Stone, which was taken from the Abbey early on Christmas Day.

Last night Scotland Yard sent an urgent warning to Special Branch and Customs men at all airports and seaports to watch for any attempt to take the Stone out of the country. Instructions were given that heavy packages should be examined and, if necessary, unpacked. A similar instruction was given to railway stations and long-distance road haulage organisations.

Reports of the Forth Anglia car which was seen near the Abbey before the disappearance of the Stone was discovered, have been received from various parts of the country, but so far the car has not been found.

Detectives believe that four or five persons were involved. So far, however, they have the description of only two persons—a man and a woman—who were seen in the car outside the Abbey about 3 a.m.

IN SCOTLAND "RUMOUR"

Among many reports flying about regarding the Stone last night, was one, fairly reliable one that the car the police are seeking to trace bore an Edinburgh registration number.

The owner of the car, it is understood, has already been interviewed by the police, and said that he recently lent the car to some people he knew.

Edinburgh police early this morning neither confirmed nor denied this story.

They also distained any knowledge of a call said to have been made to police from a call box in the north of England that the stone is now in Scotland and "safe than if under lock and key."

Meanwhile, City Police said early today that they were seeking inquiries.

Scotland Yard, it is believed, thinks the Stone is still in England, in or near London.

Mr. Hugh Young, Deputy Chief of the CID and one of London's most experienced detectives, said:

"But in this case? Oh, dear me, no. It must be one of my colleagues playing a strange sort of prank."

Rumours give the police busy night

WHERE is the Stone? A lot of people in Glasgow last night thought they knew where it was, in a night of rumour, reports, mysterious phone calls and just plain hoaxes.

At least 15 people called or phoned city police offices with a variety of stories, but the Stone is still missing.

There were chinks of a sort. One report said that the Stone was in Scotland "in safe keeping, and was hidden where no one would find it." Police were checking on this report early today.

The hoax of the night was from a telephone caller who phoned newspaper offices with the information that the Stone was in a house in the Gorbaird district of Glasgow, and that the inside J.P.B. would be carried on the Coronation Seat at Westminster Abbey stood for justice for Scotland.

3-BUS CRASH: 18 HURT

SEVENTEEN people were injured—all were later allowed home from hospital—when three buses were involved in a crash in Murray Road near Arce Road, Glasgow, last night.

Two of the buses, a single-decker Blackie and a double-decker Corporation were involved when the third bus—a double-decker—Alexander's—was overtaken by a Miniature, skidded on the wet road surface and swept broadside across the front of the buses.

Three were killed and eight injured.

One man to lead in Korea

UNITED NATIONS ground troops in Korea have been unified under the command of hard-bitten Lt.-Gen. Matthew Ridgway, who arrived in Korea today.

So ends the dual command which contributed to the disastrous offensive of the last March, U.S. 1st Division and British Commonwealth troops, eastern and western Korea.

Until his death three days ago, the late General Walter Walker, commanded the only United Nations troops along the western, or Yellow Sea, side of the peninsula.

SERIOUS PROBLEM

The 10th Corps, marching to fruitless deaths in the snow-covered wilderness of northeastern Korea, was an independent unit under the command of General Edward Almond.

Only 10,000 men for the 10th Corps were left in the north.

"NOT GOING HOME"

Proving companies of Chinese troops were definitely identified only to arrive from Seoul and General MacArthur warned that a heavy Red offensive was building up.

Vietnam soldiers of the 100,000-man 19th Corps, evacuated from the Hanoi beachhead, are all ashore today at Pusan, Southern Korea, ready to fight the Communist again on that summer's battleground.

"These troops are not going home," Vice-Admiral Jay, U.S. Navy Commander in the Far East, told correspondents in Tokyo.
